General grant programmes include small and main grants with funding awarded for between one and three years. In addition, the Emergency Essentials grants program (administered by Buttle UK) provides struggling families with items that meet children's most basic needs.

Bedford Borough Council (Bedford Borough Only)

Community Chest Fund - Up to £1,000 Core or project funding for established voluntary, charitable organisations and community groups.

The House of Industry Estate - Capital items up to £25,000 which do NOT involve works to land or property or core revenue funding for one-off emergency purposes of up to £15,000 or revenue funding for projects including those lasting for more than one year

Bedford Borough Council Rural Grants Scheme - Funding for rural organisations or rural Parish Councils for capital projects.

Members' Ward Fund - Ward Funds are intended to provide ward councillors with a flexible resource with which to address specific local priorities and can be used to help one off projects; contributions to celebration events; start-up costs for a new group or organisation for instance.

Bedfordshire & Luton Community Foundation

Bedfordshire & Luton Community Foundation manages the charitable giving and philanthropy of a range of local families and businesses. Some funding is also delivered on behalf of national charities and local/national government.

The Foundation manages several funds, each of which are targeted at a specific geography or issue. Awards are aimed at smaller community and voluntary groups to whom a sum of a few thousand pounds can make a real difference. The funds available in Bedford Borough include:

London Luton Airport Ltd (Luton Only)

- ***Community Awards Fund*** - There are two funds under this scheme, one for the Luton Borough Council area and one for its near neighbours (to the south, south west, west and north east of the Airport).
- ***Youth Services Fund*** - aimed at supporting young people aged between 11 and 19 (or 25 if disabled) across Luton. Awards of up to £50,000 across three levels of application.



London Luton Airport Operations Ltd (Luton and Central Bedfordshire Only)

Awards of up to £7,500 in support of projects which match the wishes outlined in its Community Engagement Strategy, including:

- *Creating a well-educated and skilled population (e.g. training courses for staff or volunteers that offer accreditation)*
- *Building healthy communities (e.g. healthy eating projects, sports, recreation and other linked activities)*
- *Supporting arts and culture*
- *Environmental projects*
- *Community development (e.g. bringing communities together)*

Comic Relief

Awards of up to £5,000 to increase local services, build skills of local people, increase community cohesion, respond to local economic needs or increase access to sport and exercise for people who face social exclusion and isolation.

50% of funds under this scheme are spent on access to sport and exercise.





The Panacea Society

The Panacea Charitable Trust (Bedford Borough Only)
The Foundation distributes awards on behalf of the Panacea Charitable Trust to projects where the beneficiaries are from the town of Bedford. Priority is given to groups that support those who are experiencing mental health issues or projects supporting those in poverty or with physical disabilities. The emphasis is on health/sickness, poverty and education. Awards in the region of £1000.



Kingsbrook and Cauldwell Fund (Bedford Borough Wards of Kingsbrook and Cauldwell Only)
A small awards fund created by residents of Kingsbrook and Cauldwell wards from their community plan. Awards of between £50 and £5,000 can be made to projects addressing the issues outlined in the criteria.



Removing Barriers to Volunteering in Bedford Borough (Bedford Borough Only)
Awards of up to £2,000 to help recruit, train and retain volunteers.



Bedfordshire & Luton Crimebeat
Funding of up to £500 is available for projects tackling issues of Community Safety, Crime and Anti-Social Behaviour reduction for children and young people, or projects for the wider community led by young people. Funding is also available towards transport costs for lower, middle & primary schools and the lower age range academy's to visit Hazard Alley Safety Centre in Milton Keynes. Funding towards the cost of transport for visits to Hazard Alley is limited to one visit per school in any three year period.



General Fund
Awards of up to £1,000 to fund any organisation (not necessarily a registered charity) which is seeking funds to spend on a project that will benefit those in the local community who are deprived or disadvantaged in some way (e.g. the elderly, the disabled, the isolated, the poor, etc.).

Bedfordshire Police Partnership Trust

Funding for Crime Prevention Youth Projects for any community group can apply for funding of up to £1000, but the main aim is to allow local police officers and other members of the police directly involved with the community to develop good ideas, normally based around Crime Prevention, Road Safety or Drug Awareness programmes.

Applications will be considered which generally come under the term of improving the quality of life of local communities.

The Partnership encourages applicants to speak to the trust administrator in the first instance to discuss their application.

Biffa Award

Biffa Award provides funding to community buildings and recreation projects. You can apply for grants of between £10,000 and £75,000. The project's site must be within 5 miles of a significant Biffa operation and also the project's site must also be within 10 miles of an active landfill site operated by Biffa or any other authorised landfill site managed by other operators. In the case of biodiversity projects this must be within 15 miles of an operation, this can be checked via the Biffa Award website.

The Discovery Foundation

Discovery Grants of up to £5,000 are available to fund an activity which supports one or more of our three priority themes:

- **Explorer - improving knowledge and insight** - Examples include a series of Money Management workshops to help people understand how to budget and identify the affordable credit choices available to them. A Freedom Training course giving abused women knowledge of how to regain control over their lives.
- **Transformer - developing skills and experience** - Examples include work-based training and mentors to help socially isolated people develop skills to get back into work. Sign language training for parents with hearing impaired children. Or teaching young people with autism vocational skills.
- **Changemaker - innovative solutions to social challenges** - Examples include a new social networking program for visually impaired young people which uses specially developed braille laptops to access the internet. An inclusive cycling social enterprise which adapts bicycles to enable people with disabilities to enjoy the outdoors.

Grants must directly benefit disadvantaged people in the UK and must be for something that is wholly charitable and local. Funding is available for specific projects and can cover salaries, equipment or materials for the project. Funding is only for one year and must deliver a local project, not a national initiative. We aim to fund a complete item rather than simply make a contribution to an appeal. We support health, research and palliative care charities through our staff fundraising scheme, so these are not eligible for a Discovery Grant.

Heritage Lottery Fund

Using money raised from the National Lottery, HLF funds a wide variety of heritage focused projects including wildlife, archives and community traditions. They are interested in hearing about projects from across the East of England that help people to enjoy and engage with, learn about and conserve their heritage.

A wide variety of funding programmes are available with the smallest awards starting at £3,000. Grants can support a broad range of heritage projects and there are also schemes which are targeted at specific types of heritage, such as urgent repairs for places of worship, and restoring public parks.

Langford and Biggleswade Windfarm Community Funding (specified Central Beds Communities)

This is a new fund able to provide financial assistance to any group or organisation providing that the project they wish to spend the money on is located within the Parish Boundaries of Langford and Biggleswade

The Langford and Biggleswade Wind Farm has ten 110m high wind turbines and a substation building. The turbines have been erected on land to the north of Edworth Road, Langford and south of Biggleswade between the A1 and the East Coast Mainline Railway line. The wind farm will have a life span of around 25 years, after which the site will be returned to its original condition.

A Section 106 Agreement accompanying the planning permission says that the Co-Operative (the developer) must pay an Annual Community Fund Contribution of £24,000. Supported by officers from Central Bedfordshire Council, the Langford and Biggleswade Community Fund Group (LBCFG) has been established.

In accordance with the Section 106 Agreement, the LBCFG has agreed criteria to decide what local community projects will receive financial assistance, and to what extent that assistance is given. Projects must contribute to either of the following:

- The use of Renewable Energy
- Energy conservation
- Environmental education
- Initiatives to promote greening of communities with in the 'parishes'
- The application of energy efficiency measures
- Community engagement and development
- Initiatives to encourage sustainable communities

The Mick George Community Fund provides grants of between £5,000 and £50,000, although it is unlikely that individual grants over £35,000 will be made. The fund is managed by GrantScape

Unless by invitation, organisations can only apply for a grant if their total project cost is less than £100,000.

Grants are available for community projects. Grants will be available for capital improvement works to public amenity projects. Examples may include:

The grants made under the Landfill Tax Credit Scheme look to improve community life by enhancing existing facilities as well as providing new facilities, including play areas, skate parks, community gardens, woodland improvements, greens and public parks, nature reserves, churches and religious buildings of all denominations, listed buildings, monuments & village halls.
